After 18 months of lockdown. we are delighted to be able to start singing again in school.

The children singing in assemblies fills the school with sound and is a joy to listen to.

We've always enjoyed developing singing in school, but now that we are finally allowed to sing again, we want to raise our game and aim even higher.

To help us, we have bought into specialist singing training from The Voices Foundation.

The Voices Foundation comprise a team of expert musicianship and choral practitioners who partner with teachers to develop their knowledge, skills, and confidence in effectively teaching music.

At Carr Lane we are on a mission to inspire everyone in school to sing! Our aim is to transform music education so that every child can find their voice.

Everyone has a voice, and we believe singing is a powerful way for children to become proficient musicians, excel across the curriculum and develop self-esteem.

Matt lives in Manchester but will come across at regular intervals throughout the year to spend the day with us. He will be leading singing in assemblies and in classrooms and will be passing on skills, knowledge and techniques to our teaching staff in Key Stage 2.

We need your help to keep our school and community Covid-safe and to avoid unnecessary disruption to our education

The rates of positive COVID-19 test results in Hull and the East Riding remain high. We all need to act diligently if we are to avoid unnecessary disruption to everyone's education this year.

Children or parents who have symptoms of coronavirus <u>must not</u> come to school

The main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19)

- a high temperature this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

What to do if you have symptoms

If you have any of the main symptoms of COVID-19, even if they're mild:

- 1. Get a PCR test (test that is sent to a lab) to check if you have COVID-19 as soon as possible.
- 2. Stay at home and do not have visitors (self-isolate) until you get your test result only leave your home to have a test. Check if people you live with need to self-isolate.

Please do not put yourself or others at risk.

If you have symptoms, however mild, stay away and get tested.

Avoid putting other children or staff at risk. It takes just 1 day to get test results and to be sure.

A New Reality - Learning to live with Covid

Public Health England (PHE) briefings to Headteachers in the East Riding make it clear that we all have to learn to live with Covid in our schools and our communities. The country is no longer trying to stop Covid completely—for that to happen society would have to go back into lockdown and schools would have to revert to remote education for all except key workers. Both of these have enormously damaging impact on individuals and society.

With the introduction of vaccines, hospitalisations have reduced by 95%. PHE report rates of infection remain high but cases in hospitals remain low.

Society has transitioned from trying to eradicate Covid entirely to balancing the spread of infection to what they deem 'an acceptable level of virus circulation' as it spreads out; a level where hospitals do not get overwhelmed. This will be the case for years to come.

It is within this context that we work at school. We know that there will be a level of Covid circulating amongst children and adults in our community: in schools, shops, restaurants, cinemas, clubs etc. Our aim is to limit the rate of spread of infection to avoid major disruption. We know that over time many staff will get Covid, but we need to stop this happening all at once - if it spread rapidly amongst staff, then it would be disastrous and we would struggle to continue to offer face to face teaching and other aspects of school operations such as hot lunches. Similarly, we know that over time many children will test positive, but if that happens all at once, it would cause major problems in our community.

It is for these reasons that we maintain measures based on social distancing (including online staff meetings and parents' evenings), self-isolation, ventilation, hygiene, enhanced cleaning and testing. As we approach Christmas we will continue to take advice from PHE as to whether we should hold large mixing events, including for example, the EYFS nativity. We are currently planning on the basis that they will be allowed, but we all need to be prepared for live performances not to go ahead. As we move through the second half of the Autumn Term, we will continue to take advice from PHE who are monitoring case numbers across the region.

Over the past few weeks, we have seen 'outbreaks' of Covid in Year 6 and in Year 4. To clarify, an 'outbreak' is defined by PHE as 10% of a group of close-contact children who become infected at around the same time. So, if we get 3 children in a class with a positive PCR test at around the same time, then it is classified as an outbreak. At this point, and following PHE consultation, we put in extra contingency measures for the following 10 days. These include children in the affected year group not attending assemblies, not travelling on buses and reduced use of the cloakroom. Given that, for the foreseeable future, covid will always be circulating in school, children who are waiting for results or who do not test positive should still attend school.

As always, we thank you for working with us to help get through these continually challenging times.




Hotseating "Floella Benjamin" to see how she felt about being left alone. This experience will definitely help us in our letter writing!
