New Touchscreen technology arrives in school.

As the current stock of Interactive whiteboards and projectors in school are nearing the end of their life, we are replacing them with interactive LCD screens. The first screens have been installed in Year 3 classes last week and two more are currently being installed in the Year 1 classrooms this week.

One of the key advantages of the LCD screens is that they do not require a projector. They are basically like a 65" television that you can write on which means that there are no shadows cast on the screen by anyone standing in front of it.

The images are much clearer, brighter and sharper. The resolution is much higher—a '4K UHD resolution' (3840 x 2160 -8.3 megapixel) for the technically minded. The children certainly approve and so do the staff.


Going forwards, we hope to replace all of the old interactive whiteboards within the next 12-18 months, as finances allow.

This hasn't come about by accident; they have been training nearly every Wednesday lunchtime since September.



Our Easter Bonnet parade for Infant children will take place in the afternoon from 3.00pm to 3.20pm.



Meet the Governors Kerry Boughen

We are fortunate to have an excellent team of governors who bring with them an extensive skill set and knowledge base including: personnel, finance and accountancy, health, safeguarding, business development, education, policy development, sports development, SEN, ICT, and mental health.

Moreover, most of our governors are parents of children at school which means they are committed to our school community and our vision, that:

- All of our pupils will enjoy their education and make excellent progress regardless of their starting point
- Everyone matters, is cared for, included and valued
- Our school will work in partnership with others but will retain our own local community control

In this article, our school governor, Kerry Boughen, introduces herself...

I have been a parent governor for a year and value the opportunity to support the school in providing a safe and happy environment for children.

The role is varied however I've found that my professional experience has been invaluable in this role, I worked as a Community Nurse for children with learning disabilities for 15 years and currently work as a Named Nurse for safeguarding children in a local health trust, safeguarding young people is integral to my work. I am able to use my knowledge and skills in my role as a governor with safeguarding responsibilities, to support the safeguarding lead in ensuring the welfare of the pupils is prioritised and the focus on wellbeing and



effective care is maintained.

I am able to share priority safeguarding areas with the safeguarding lead and other governors as they arise from legislation, research or practice developments.

Safeguarding is threaded throughout all school activities, this is not an exhaustive list, but may include:

- Pupil attendance
- Staff training
- Safe recruitment
- Allegations against staff
- Pupil well-being
 - The Prevent duty (preventing people from being drawn into terrorism)
- Online safety
- Addressing complaints

I provide support to the governing body and the safeguarding lead in ensuring all policies and procedures reflect the appropriate responses to safeguarding children issues - how these are identified and managed. At times this means that I am required to review policies and add suggestions and amendments. I also help the school in their duty to provide evidence and assurances for inspections and to the East Riding Safeguarding Children Partnership (ERSCP) that they are meeting all safeguarding requirements.

I have the opportunity to review and scrutinise the safeguarding report that is regularly submitted to the ERSCP detailing all of the school's safeguarding activity.

The school is also required to complete a safeguarding self assessment every 3 years. The most recent one was completed with my support in 2018. I was able to meet with staff and evidence their excellent working knowledge and awareness of safeguarding processes. I also had a great response to a safeguarding survey that was sent to staff in the school.

I enjoy working with the school and the other governors, it's a varied and interesting role that really helps to understand all of the work that goes on behind the scenes in the school. As a parent, I underestimated this previously. I get a lot of satisfaction knowing that I am giving something back and helping the school achieve the high standards that it aspires to.

Red Nose Day




