As part of our School Improvement Plans for 2019-20, the staff will be reviewing the detailed content of each subject taught. At primary school we teach a lot of subjects outside of Maths and English. The National Curriculum includes, Science, Art and Design, Computing, Design and Technology, Geography, History, Languages, Music and PE. We also cover PSHCE and RE. Over the course of this year the teachers will be conducting a detailed review of the knowledge and skills that we teach to each year group in each subject. As your child progresses through school, the curriculum builds progressively so that they can build on the knowledge and skills learnt in preceding years and develop and extend their subject specific vocabulary in the process.



Healthy Packed Lunches

We believe it is important that the young children in our care eat healthily. In the science curriculum, pupils are made aware of the benefits of healthy eating and the risks of a poor diet. In PSHCE we learn how to keep both our bodies and minds healthy.

Our hot school meals are prepared following national guidance on nutrition and provide a balanced diet. When children bring in their own packed lunch from home, we also ask that it be healthy, nutritious and well-balanced.

We recommend that a balanced packed lunch should contain

- starchy food (e.g. bread, bagal, wrap, pitta or pasta)
- protein foods (e.g. meat, fish, eggs beans)
- a dairy item (e.g. cheese or yoghurt)
- · vegetables or salad
- a portion of fruit
- a drink such as water or fruit juice

The lunch box may also contain ONE of the following for that extra energy boost:

- Small packet of crisps
- Sweet option small piece



of cake, biscuit or cookie.

There should be no sweets or chocolate or fizzy drinks in school and, as I'm sure you'll understand, should they come into school, they will be confiscated and returned to parents at the end of the day.
